

# New grant to focus on equity and improvement



Last week, the Tulare County Office of Education (TCOE) learned that it would receive a Model Design & Initiation (MDI) grant from the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation. TCOE was the only K-12 agency in California among the current cohort of MDI grantees. The MDI grant is the second grant awarded to TCOE by the foundation; the first was used to fund the original Central Valley Networked Improvement Community (CVNIC).

As an MDI grantee, TCOE will work to increase its knowledge and skills in the areas of diversity, equity, and inclusion; measurement and evaluation; and to scale its continuous improvement expertise more broadly across the organization. As a culminating grant activity, TCOE intends to codify its learning through the development of a Network for School Improvement (NSI) in order to facilitate countywide implementation. The future countywide NSI will be used to increase the academic outcomes for Black, Latino, and low-income secondary students in Tulare and Kings counties.

# UC Merced/SCICON Field Station hosts science study weekend

Last weekend, the UC Merced/SCICON Field Station hosted its annual field research event at the Circle J-Norris Ranch. High school students attended the three-day event to study the health of the site's foothill oaks.



Thirty-one students participated from Monache, Porterville, and Granite Hills High Schools. Under the leadership of UC Merced Professor Jessica Blois and Circle J-Norris Ranch lead teacher Nancy Bruce, the students surveyed plots and measured oak trees on the 640-acre site. The Field Station's oak mortality study began during an internship program in June. Additionally, timber assessment training was provided by foresters from Cal Fire and the Tule Reservation.

"We are delighted that more students are getting connected to UC Merced and our partners through these events, and seeing the career opportunities in the sciences," said Tulare County Superintendent of Schools Tim Hire. The event concluded with presentations from each student group on their findings. # Kings River students bring history to life at Fresno's Civil War Reenactment

Eighteen years ago, students at Kings River Union School began to replicate Early American history on campus. After researching a historic figure, students became that person for a day to experience what it may have been like to live in their time period.

Seeing the students enact their characters, Sharon Hiigal of the Fresno Historical Society asked if Kings River Union students would consider helping with the annual Civil War Reenactment her organization held annually at Kearney Park in Fresno. She envisioned a readers' theater based on the writing of children who lived during the Civil War, specifically in Gettysburg. The students performed so well that Kings River students have been asked back for 18 years.



Kings River Union Superintendent Sherry Martin said, "Our students have covered topics such as Gettysburg, the siege of Vicksburg, the burning of Atlanta, the Civil War's Naval Battles, and Civil War Medicine. This year our script involved what happened to children when war came to their own front doors. Our students always begin and end each performance by saying, 'Some of these events were sweet and tender, and some were like living a nightmare, but all the events are told through the experiences of children, and told in their own words.'"

Kings River Union sixth-grade teacher Patrick Delgado and retired educator Janet Kelly worked together with students and parents to create an experience for audiences visiting the Fresno Civil War Reenactment that makes history come alive. On October 18 and 19, Kings River students performed 24 times, bringing a voice to children who lived 150 years ago. Mr. Delgado reports that Kings River's performances are among the most requested at the annual event because they tell the stories of children often unheard in history.

# Tulare Kings College and Career Collaborative holds second annual Manufacturing Day

Last week, the Tulare Kings College and Career Collaborative held its second annual TK Manufacturing (MFG) Day. MFG Day is a nationwide event where manufacturing facilities open their doors to students to explore industry careers. Locally, the event served approximately 150 students from eight high schools and one community college. The students were members of high school pathway programs focused on manufacturing and engineering.



The participants were able to tour two of the eleven participating facilities in the morning and join together to learn about related community college programs and share lunch conversations with business partners. The Tulare and Kings county manufacturers included TF Tire, Advanced Food Products, Diamond Crystal, Screw Conveyor, Electric Motor Shop, Hilti, Joann Fabric, Agusa, McClellan, TC Transcontinental, and Perfection Pet Foods.

The College and Career Collaborative partnered with the Workforce Investment Board of Tulare County and the Kings County Economic Development Corporation to connect students with local manufacturers and expand their perspectives on manufacturing careers. # Holocaust survivor Gabriella Karin visits La Sierra Military Academy

On October 18, La Sierra Military Academy welcomed Holocaust survivor Gabriella Karin, who shared her painful story of survival with the cadets and staff. Ms. Karin, a Jew, spent three years of her childhood in a Catholic convent in Bratislava, Slovakia, before moving with family members to a one-bedroom apartment owned by a man who risked his life to house them.

Ms. Karin's presentation was made possible through a partnership the school has with The California Holocaust Education & Resource Center of Visalia (CHERC). For three years, La Sierra students – along with many other community members – have collected and counted buttons to represent each of the six million Jews who lost their lives during the Holocaust.
