


Welcome to News Gallery Week

Students participate in first UC Merced/SCICON Field Station internship

Loaded with GPS devices, stakes, fence post drivers, ropes, tape measures and clipboards, 16 Tulare County high school students trekked deep into the Circle J-Norris Ranch last week as part of the new UC Merced/SCICON Field Station internship program. The interns were on site June 25-27 to participate in the first phase of an ongoing tree survey project in conjunction with the new field station.



Before beginning their tree survey work, the interns received a lesson on geographic information systems (GIS) from a woman who utilizes the tool in her job every day. Patty Rueger, GIS analyst for The Wonderful Company in Delano, demonstrated how she uses satellite and aerial maps to analyze the health of her company's citrus groves. Mrs. Rueger then showed students a map of Circle J-Norris Ranch and explained that they would be surveying 26 circles, each one-tenth of an acre in size. Within the circular sites, which were randomly chosen with a mapping application, students were to count, tag and record information on each tree as part of an ongoing oak mortality research project.



In the field, students used the coordinates on their hand-held GPS to find the center of the first survey site. Nancy Bruce, lead teacher at Circle J-Norris Ranch, and Amanda Driver, pathway

lead at Monache High School's Environmental Science Academy, helped students determine the boundaries of their survey site and to count and tag the trees within it. Dr. Jessica Blois, faculty director of UC Merced's Natural Reserves, helped students understand how to correctly record their data and how it would be used by future researchers.



At the conclusion of the three-day internship, students collected data and prepared short presentations for Tulare County Superintendent of Schools Tim Hire and SCICON Director Dianne Shew. "We hope that this internship program will lead more Tulare County students to see UC Merced as a place for them to continue their studies, particularly if they're interested in environmental sciences," said Mr. Hire.



Through the vision of former Tulare County Superintendent of Schools Jim Vidak, the Tulare County Office of Education and UC Merced created a much-needed research site in the Sierra

Nevada foothills which will expose students to higher education learning and environmental science career opportunities.

The second phase of the internship will be held at Circle J-Norris Ranch on October 26. High school students and teachers interested in participating in the UC Merced/SCICON Field Station internship program in the future are encouraged to contact Dianne Shew at (559) 539-2642.
