

Registration now open for tech-based educator training, student event

STUDENT TECH SHOWDOWN

Registration is now open for the Fifth Annual Tech Rodeo, a full day of virtual learning for educators, administrators, and coaches to meet the needs of students in all grade levels and content areas. Registration is also open for the virtual Student Tech Showdown, a technology-based competition first held at Tech Rodeo in January 2020.

Scheduled for Saturday, January 16, Tech Rodeo will offer attendees choices of interactive sessions exploring instructional technology on a wide variety of devices for today's classrooms. The event will also offer attendees the opportunity to meet several published education technology authors and access a variety of three-minute instructional quick tips. The Student Tech Showdown, also scheduled for January 16, is a competition created to integrate International Society for Technology in Education (ISTE) Standards for Students into a competition involving research and presentation skills. Through the Student Tech Showdown, students in grades 4-12 – working in teams of two or three – will have the opportunity to showcase their research, digital citizenship, collaboration, communication, and design skills through the use of technology.

Prior to the event, student teams will research this year's scenario – bridging the digital divide. At the Student Tech Showdown, teams will utilize their research to create a presentation on the spot. Utilizing feedback from other teams, participants will have an opportunity to refine their work before making a final presentation. Educators attending the Tech Rodeo will have the opportunity to observe the students for inspiration on creating similar lessons in their classrooms. At the end of the competition, winning teams in grade categories 4-5, 6-8, and 9-12 will be announced.

Annual CAC calendar highlights students with special needs finding success through distance learning

Earlier this month, the Special Services Division distributed thousands of copies of the annual Community Advisory Committee (CAC) calendar to schools, community organizations, and clinics. Entitled "Meeting Challenges through Distance Learning," the 2021 calendar features monthly profiles of students with special needs adjusting to learning at home.

Each month, the calendar highlights different Tulare County students and the successes they have found during distance learning. Profiles include students receiving speech therapy, behavioral health services, coping and self-regulation skills instruction, and reading, writing, communication, and motor skills development. "More than any other year, this calendar depicts how students, parents, and teachers have adapted and succeeded in difficult



circumstances," said Tulare County Superintendent of Schools Tim Hire. "We applaud the creativity of the staff and parents in meeting the instructional needs of some very special young people!"

State education code established the creation of CACs. In Tulare County, this 16-member committee is made up of parents of students with special needs, parents of general education students, general and special education teachers, representatives from community agencies, and a student or adult with special needs. The organization has created an annual calendar highlighting special education for more than 25 years.

Pat Greco continues improvement work with district leaders

On November 13, Dr. Pat Greco held the first of three trainings as part of this year's Learning and Leadership Forum. Dr. Greco's presentation built on her work with district leaders conducted last year and included tools and approaches for developing culture, leadership, and strategies for organizational improvement.
