

Slick Rock Student Film Festival awards program set to air on ABC30 Sunday evening



The public is invited to watch the Slick Rock Student Film Festival awards special airing on ABC30 Sunday, May 24, at 6:30 p.m. Traditionally, the awards program for Central California's largest student film festival has been held at the Visalia Fox Theater, complete with limo rides, paparazzi, a red carpet walk, and an Academy Awards-style ceremony. While the COVID-19 pandemic forced the Tulare County Office of Education to cancel the awards ceremony, winners in the festival's 18 film categories will be recognized during the half-hour special. At the end of the program, one middle school and one high school film will be given "best of show" honors.



This year, the festival accepted 569 film entries from 60 Central Valley middle schools and high schools. These films represent the work of over 1,000 students from schools in Fresno, Kern, Kings, Madera, Merced, and Tulare counties. In addition to the "best of show" and category award winners, over 200 of the submitted films received "Premiere Cut" honors. # Bright Start children supported at home through a variety of technologies





Eliza is a happy toddler who enjoys blowing bubbles, running in the park, watering plants, and dancing. Eliza's father captured the girl on video doing these everyday activities to share with her teachers from the Bright Start program. Teachers Jessica Nieto and Sally Coronado appreciate the videos as they are interested in assessing the development of Eliza's various motor skills. Prior to the COVID-19 pandemic, these assessments would have been done in the child's home on a regular basis. Today, Bright Start staff rely on parents and a variety of technologies to monitor the progress of their little clients.



Bright Start staff and parents work together as a team to support their children's development. Based on each child's unique needs, staff provides parent coaching to integrate instruction into daily activities related to a variety of therapies, including physical, occupational, speech, feeding, and behavioral. Across the county, families of nearly 1,000 children, ages 0-3, are served by the Bright Start Program, including 160 children at risk for autism served by the FACES Program. Seventy-five children and adolescents with autism are provided therapeutic behavioral services through the Bright Future Program.





For the past two months, staff have been creative in using technology to connect with parents to offer support and suggestions and to assess children's progress. Zoom meetings, texts, FaceTime and video exchanges are being used to effectively maintain support to families. "All of our families have reported great appreciation for our continued remote service," said Ron Pekarek, Bright Start program manager. "The trust and teamwork established prior to our isolation has paid off in being able to continue our services without much interruption. We appreciate each parent who has pitched in to aid us in supporting their children."

Last week, the College Night Scholarship Committee interviewed nine outstanding finalists who applied for the annual, four-year scholarship. The committee selected Kylea Moshier, a senior at Redwood High School, as the recipient of the 2020 College Night Scholarship Award.

Kylea has been accepted to Azusa Pacific University and is majoring in both business administration and humanities as part of the university's Honors College. She also intends to pursue a minor in Spanish. Kylea aspires to work for a nonprofit organization or in healthcare administration as a chief financial officer. While at Redwood, Kylea was an outstanding scholar with many distinctions awarded to her not only for academics, but for her character, school spirit, accomplishments as a scholar-athlete, and involvement in numerous activities,



including the California Scholarship Federation, World Languages, ASB, Fellowship of Christian Athletes, Link Crew, choir, track and field, and volleyball. She credits her volunteer work with Hands in the Community, a local nonprofit service organization, as a truly impactful experience.

As the winner of the College Night Scholarship, Kylea will receive \$1,000 per year for up to four years while she attends a college or university.
