In partnership with Alianza Ecologista – a
Tulare County environmental alliance – Circle J
- Norris Ranch is holding its Community
Biodiversity Festival Saturday, February 26.
The public is invited to attend and participate in fun, hands-on activities suitable for the whole family.

Beginning at 9:00 a.m., attendees can participate in the annual BioBlitz to document the biodiversity of Circle J utilizing the iNaturalist app. With help from student guides, attendees will be challenged to photograph unique living organisms they discover and upload the images to the Circle J Biodiversity Project on the iNaturalist website. Attendees interested in participating in the BioBlitz are encouraged to download the



iNaturalist app to their devices prior to the event. Data collected from BioBlitz enables the program to create online instructional resources for classes to access and learn more about the species they will see at the ranch.

Following a lunch break, attendees will spend the afternoon planting trees for future wildlife habitats.

Circle J - Norris Ranch is the beautiful 620-acre field study site located in the Sierra foothills. The program, which is operated by the SCICON school of outdoor education, offers all grade levels a wide variety of field study experiences that enrich and extend classroom learning. Studies conducted on the property are designed to expand the appreciation of the environmental and aesthetic values of the outdoors, and increase understanding of the relationship between humans and nature. Last week, the Theatre Company created two additional workshops in its campaign to offer performance training opportunities for students throughout the county. The new

March workshops, based at the Lindsay Community Center, include a four-week dance boot camp and a four-week acting boot camp for students in grades 9 - 12.

The new Lindsay workshops bring the total number of spring trainings to 11 with inperson offerings also in Visalia and Exeter. Several of the trainings include Zoom options for students.

Theatre Company choreographer McKenna Friend-Hoffman will lead the high school dance workshop, providing instruction in the most popular theatrical dance styles, including jazz and/or tap. Students will focus on technique fundamentals while building strength and increasing flexibility. The workshop will be offered at the Lindsay Community Center on Thursdays, March 3, 10, 17, and 24 from 4:15 until 5:30 p.m. The cost of the class is \$20 per student and enrollment is limited. Theatre Company director Bethany Rader will lead the high school acting workshop on Tuesdays, March 8, 15, 22, and 29. The workshop will also be offered at the Lindsay Community Center from 4:15 until 5:30 p.m. In this workshop, students will learn how to select and prepare the right monologue for different auditions, and how to find and explore a character. California State Library makes new STEM resources available



Last week, the California School Library Association held its e-Resources Showcase 2022 for school, district, and county office of education teacher/librarians in partnership with California's K-12 Online Content Project. Since 2018, California's K-12 Online Content Project, a service of the California State Library, has made a wide variety of free research and homework tools available to every school-age student in the state. Last month, the online resource program introduced new student STEM (science, technology, engineering, mathematics) resources.

The online STEM tools were created through a new state partnership with education technology company, Gale. The Gale resources include: National Geographic Kids, which allows students to explore science, nature, culture, archaeology, and space. The Gale In Context: Environmental Studies resources broaden student understanding of global environmental issues through topic overviews, journals, news, and multimedia content. Gale's Interactive: Science allows students to manipulate 3D interactive models to visualize and understand biology, chemistry, earth, and space science concepts.

Through California's K-12 Online Content Project, students can research, analyze, and use information and media for classwork and homework help. Teachers can also go online to build lesson plans geared to the interests and needs of their students. Family members are also able to access the site to participate and support the learning process at home. Central Section hosts first Women In Sports Conference



The CIF Central Section hosted its first <u>Women In Sports Conference</u> Wednesday in the Redwood Conference Center at the Tulare County Office of Education.

The keynote speakers were former MiLB general manager Jennifer Reynolds and educator and mentor, Dr. Brenda Lewis. There were three breakout sessions: Title IX and Beyond with Karen Wood, Being a College Athlete with Ally Briano, and The Power To Be Your Own Superhero with Katie Williamson.

The conference was the idea of Central Section commissioner Ryan Tos and Central Section administrative assistant Kelly Jones. When the two were previously at the San

Joaquin Section, they held a similar event. The conference also coincided with the 50th anniversary of Title IX.

Title IX was passed on June 23, 1972 by Congress. The new law gave women and girls the right to play sports and read, "No person in the United States shall, on the basis of sex, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be subjected to discrimination under any education program or activity receiving Federal financial assistance."

On the conference, Tos said, "We think it's important to do something to support women in sport, and it's just an opportunity for our student-athletes to see and hear different leaders."

The Central Section plans to host a Women in Sports Conference every other year and a student leadership conference for the years in between.
