

# Students awarded Best of Show honors in annual Student Art Exhibition



In conjunction with National Arts Education month, organizers of the annual Student Art Exhibition have selected over 200 Best of Show winners from pieces in this year's exhibition.

The Student Art Exhibition opened as a virtual art gallery in December. The gallery features 476 hand-drawn and digital works, photographs, and sculptures from 43 Tulare County schools.

From the 476 submissions, judges selected 207 works for Best of Show honors. Students, educators, and community members are invited to visit the gallery at **tcoe.org/ArtGallery** to see the pieces selected, which are organized into smaller galleries by school.



# Tulare County College Night Scholarship deadline extended

First awarded in 2006, the annual Tulare County College Night Scholarship is given to one graduating senior who has an outstanding academic record and a commitment to community service. The scholarship was envisioned by the TCOE College Night Committee as a \$1,000 award, renewable for up to four consecutive years.

Tulare County graduating seniors are invited to submit applications for the College Night Scholarship by visiting **cnsa.tcoe.org/Welcome**. The application deadline has been extended to March 25, 2022.



The website includes information on the submission requirements, including an application, two written essays, two academic recommendations, and official transcripts. Finalists for the scholarship will be interviewed by the committee April 28.

#### School nurse Ana Borba receives Excellence in School Nursing Award

Last month, TCOE school nurse Ana Borba was awarded the Excellence in School Nursing Award for the Central Valley Section of the California School Nurses Organization. For nearly 22 years, Borba has provided school nursing services in several small Tulare County school districts.

"Ana is a person who has a wealth of nursing knowledge, dedication, compassion, and drive," said Christina Rodriguez, program manager of School Health Programs. "She is seen as a leader in the field of school nursing as she provides and improves access to healthcare for our students and families in Tulare County."

A graduate of the College of the Sequoias nursing program, Borba began



her career in 1985, working in surgery at Sacred Heart Hospital in Hanford and Hanford Community Hospital. Borba later worked at Sierra View District Hospital in Porterville and was trained to become one of the first Registered Nurse First Assistant (RNFA) in Tulare County, having completed UCLA's certification program. In 1995, she obtained her bachelor's degree and Public Health Nurse Certificate from CSU Dominguez Hills. In 2016, she obtained her Master of Science in Nursing from Fresno State University.

In 2000, Borba joined the Tulare County Office of Education as a credentialed school nurse. "I quickly learned that nursing in the educational setting meant you were more than a nurse, but a mentor, liaison, and a friend to the students, families, and staff," she said.

Currently, Borba primarily serves Alta Vista School in Porterville. She works closely with her district superintendent on policies to ensure the optimal health of students and staff. She developed and implemented the COVID-19 testing program and is an active member of the school's teams for Multi-tiered System of Supports, Individualized Educational Plans, and leadership.
