

TCOE welcomes Dedi Somavia, Chris Meyer

This summer, the Tulare County Office of Education will welcome two new administrators to the Human Resources Division. Dedi Somavia will be TCOE's new Assistant Superintendent of Human Resources, while Chris Meyer will be the new Director of Human Resources and Risk Management. John Rodriguez, who oversaw Human Resources since 2012, is retiring in July.

"We are delighted to welcome Dedi and Chris to TCOE," said Tim Hire, Tulare County Superintendent of Schools. "Both have extensive experience in human resources and education – as teachers, principals, and administrators. Their addition to our Human Resources Division will increase our capacity to serve TCOE staff and programs, and expand our support to Tulare County school districts."

Dedi Somavia is the assistant superintendent of Human Resources Development for Visalia Unified School District (VUSD) and has been part of VUSD since 2001. Prior to being an assistant superintendent at VUSD, she was an administrator for Human Resources Development. She was also a principal for Crestwood Elementary School; an assistant principal for Fairview Elementary School and Crowley Elementary School, respectively; and a teacher, curriculum coach and principal designee for Elbow Creek Elementary School. Somavia began her



career in education as an elementary school teacher in Fresno Unified School District. She was chosen the Association of California School Administrator's Administrator of the Year for Personnel/Human Resources in 2019.

On her new role, Somavia said, "I am humbled to have been selected as the Assistant Superintendent, Human Resources for Tulare County Office of Education. I am excited for the opportunity to serve the students, staff, and community in this new role."

Chris Meyer has served as the superintendent of Monson-Sultana Joint Union School District since 2015. Prior to his time at Monson-Sultana, Meyer served Dinuba Unified School District as a principal of Dinuba High School and Jefferson Elementary School. At Jefferson, he was also a learning director and academic coach. Meyer began his career in education as a teacher with Lincoln Elementary School in Dinuba.

"I look forward to joining the great team at TCOE and continuing to serve staff and students across the county," Meyer said.

Cherí Barnes, Human Resources Analyst, Human Resources, 26 years

As an analyst for the Tulare County Office of Education's Human Resources Division, Cherí Barnes provided TCOE administrators the support they need for hiring, negotiations, policies and procedures, and leaves of absence. Barnes was praised by her coworkers for her natural ability to problem-solve and her initiative to make her staff more accessible to TCOE program managers. Tulare County school districts often sought her



guidance when researching human resources policies and procedures. Barnes led the

Nancy Bellin to speak at Tulare Historical Museum event

The Tulare Historical Museum is hosting an event titled A History & Testimony of the Japanese American Internment with a focus on the Tulare Assembly Center. The event is on Thursday, June 23 from 6 p.m. to 8 p.m. at the museum. TCOE's Nancy Bellin, a Japanese American, will be speaking at the event as part of a panel. When Bellin was a child living in Orosi, she and her family were sent to internment camps, including the one at the Tulare Fairgrounds called the "Tulare Assembly Center."



This event is being held in partnership with the cultural history class at Mission Oak High School, which will also present a brief history. In addition, there will be a question-and-answer session with the panel. The panel is made up of surviving Japanese American internees.

The Tulare Historical Museum is located at 444 W. Tulare Avenue in Tulare.
