

29th annual Excellence in Education Awards held this morning



This morning at the Tulare County Office of Education, 36 extraordinary Tulare County educators and school employees were honored at the 29th annual Excellence in Education Awards – an event co-hosted by EECU.

The nominees were submitted by Tulare County school districts in three categories – Administrator/Manager of the Year, Teacher of the Year, and School Employee of the Year. A committee of Tulare County business and education leaders individually reviewed and scored each nominee to determine the winners, who were announced in April. At the conclusion of the event, the category winners posed with Tulare County Superintendent of Schools Tim Hire (far left). The winners were (left to right) Administrator/Manager of the Year Tammy Bradford (Tulare County Office of Education), Teacher of the Year Jennifer Powers (Tulare City School District), and School Employee of the Year Sonya Yvonne Lopez (Porterville Unified School District).

"Our winners are deeply committed and creative individuals – educators who go to great lengths to engage students and provide opportunities for them that they may not otherwise experience," Hire said.

Tickets are still available for the Saturday showing of the Stage and Space Collaborative's The War of the Worlds. This live and fully immersive production was created by the Stage and Space Collaborative in partnership with TCOE's Theatre Company and Planetarium & Science Center.

Broadcast from New York's Mercury Theatre in 1938, the infamous radio play – based on the novel by H. G. Wells – had some terrified listeners convinced that an actual alien invasion of Earth was taking place. The community is invited to come, sit back, and enjoy this frightening tale of an extraterrestrial takeover.

The War of the Worlds will transport audiences back to 1938, complete with sound effects, original art projections, and exciting live performances from TCOE student actors. After the show, ticket holders are invited to move to the Planetarium for a fall night sky presentation to learn about the constellations visible this season.

The production will have a sold-out premiere on October 27. Tickets are still available for the October 28 showings at 2:00 p.m. and 5:00 p.m.

While working at SEE, Cha has acted as a trainer for new staff, and has taken on young participants to gain work experience in SEE's office, training and mentoring them until they were ready to move to permanent jobs within the community.

Bright Future uses fall outing for students to practice their skills

Last week, the Bright Future Program invited its students to meet the animals at Ford Farms in Lindsay. Nearly 40 students attended with their family members to feed and pet a variety of furry friends.

While the animals are fun, the learning doesn't stop. Ron Pekarek, program manager, shared that these outings are a way for students to practice the skills they're learning in a Bright Start center while out in the community. "It's a great opportunity to practice skills such as working in a group, waiting, socializing



with peers, requesting, labeling, transitioning, and more," he said.

The Bright Future Program offers center-based Applied Behavioral Analysis (ABA) services for children, ages 3 to 5, with a diagnosis of autism spectrum disorder (ASD). Center-based ABA treatment allows for one-on-one instruction in combination with natural learning and opportunities for socialization in a structured environment.
