


# UPHS student immerses herself in architectural studies at COS Tulare; UPHS plans new location midway between Visalia and Tulare



Tieu-Tam Bui's journey toward a career in architecture began in fourth grade. While visiting her father's office, where he worked for a home developer, she passed the office of local architect. What she saw in that office stopped her in her tracks. There in the architect's office she recalls seeing a drafting table and a rendering of a building project done in watercolors. "I remember standing there and staring for minutes," said the University Preparatory High School (UPHS) senior. "I was really inspired by that and started asking my dad (questions) because I didn't know what the profession of architecture was."

Today the young woman has taken that inspiration and turned it into further education and work experience at the local firm of DKJ Architects. To further her education in architecture, Tieu-Tam is enrolled in College of the Sequoias (COS) courses, which are uniquely available at the COS Tulare campus. All UPHS students are expected to complete a minimum of 20 COS units to graduate.

Growing up, Tieu-Tam's interest in architecture remained constant in her mind. While she enjoyed science and math, she also enjoyed art, graphic design, and photography. "Architecture was the greatest field I knew that is a combination of art and science," she said.

Following her love for science, she discovered UPHS, located on the COS Visalia campus, through a friend who told her that the school had an official robotics team – an activity that the two of them had enjoyed in middle school. After doing research on the school, she applied. "I'm a first-generation college student," she said. "When I heard that I could take college classes for free, I decided no matter what, that had to take precedent. And now after being here for four years in progress, I feel like that was definitely the right decision." Tieu-Tam also noted that many of her peers also wanted to attend a small school where they could get extra support.

While at UPHS, Tieu-Tam has taken COS courses in freehand drawing, and Architectural History I and II. She is currently taking Architectural Design I and plans to take Architectural Design II in the spring. Next year, she plans to attend a university with an architectural program so that she can work toward becoming a licensed architect.



About her internship, she said, "DKJ Architects works a lot with schools and seeing how firms like this can give back to a community in that way is very meaningful. I also appreciate that architects help schools through the decision-making process in creating environments where kids are going to learn and establish their foundations."

While Tieu-Tam has made the trek from UPHS to Tulare, future generations of students will have easier access to COS Tulare courses. In August 2027, the school will open on a new campus at 11535 Avenue 264 in Visalia – the same site as the Planetarium & Science Center. The Mooney Boulevard site was chosen because it is nearly midway between both COS' Visalia and Tulare campuses.

"We look forward to this exciting opportunity to relocate and expand this special school," said Tulare County Superintendent of Schools Tim Hire. "We appreciate those who helped to create UPHS – founding principal John Kelly, former Tulare County Superintendent of Schools Jim Vidak, the UPHS faculty and staff, and the UPHS Parent

Support Organization. We also appreciate the tremendous support of COS President/Superintendent Dr. Brent Calvin and his staff and faculty for providing us a home and special opportunities for students!"

University Preparatory High School (UPHS) has thrived on the COS Visalia campus. Now as the college and high school continue to grow, UPHS will transition to its own campus, offering students the choice of taking COS classes in Visalia, Tulare, or both.

University Preparatory High School is now in its 15th year. Founded in 2009, the school was conceived as a four-year public high school where students – particularly those who may be the first in their family to attend college – could get the guidance and encouragement to be successful in college. All were welcome to attend and work hard at both high school and college classes with the support of caring faculty and staff.

UPHS' success in preparing students for college and career earned it one of the highest college-going rates in Tulare County and the distinction of twice being named a California Distinguished School by the California Department of Education.

This month, UPHS begins recruiting for incoming classes of students, including the Class of 2027-28, the first class to graduate from the new campus.
