California Friday Night Live Partnership orchestrates annual statewide Roadwatch Snapshot



Earlier this month, youth leaders from Friday Night Live (FNL) chapters across the state conducted the Roadwatch Snapshot to record instances of distracted driving. The annual event is coordinated by the California Friday Night Live Partnership, housed with the Tulare County Office of Education.

Fueled by the desire to improve traffic safety in their neighborhoods, FNL youth monitored 30 intersections near high schools across the state, observing over 4,000 instances of distracted driving in a one-hour timeframe – an average of nearly 70 occurrences of distracted driving every minute. Distracted driving includes anything that takes your eyes, hands, or mind away from the task of driving.

No surprise, students reported that the top distractions were cellphone use, passenger-related distractions, and eating and drinking. Some of the extraordinary distractions observed included dropping off children at school while in traffic and running red lights.

More than just cellphone use, distracted driving is categorized by California Highway Patrol (CHP) as a range of activities that impact a driver's visual, auditory, physical, or cognitive abilities when driving.

"The CHP encourages drivers to make the conscious decision to drive distraction free every time they get behind the wheel of a vehicle," CHP Commissioner Sean Duryee said. "Every distraction, even for just a few seconds, increases your chances of being involved in a crash..."

Among those administering the Roadwatch survey were students from a new Friday Night Live chapter at Redwood High School in Visalia.
