On Tuesday evening, TCOE's Pursuing Victory with Honor (PVWH) Program held its second annual PVWH Honors Banquet. Over 400 students receive Seal of Biliteracy through the county office



This graduation season, Tulare County Office of Education proudly celebrates the accomplishments of high school students who earned the California State Seal of Biliteracy. This year, TCOE has recognized 421 students with this prestigious state-level honor.

The California State Seal of Biliteracy recognizes students who have demonstrated proficiency in both English and at least one other language. To qualify, students must meet rigorous criteria. TCOE certifies that each students meets the requirements for the State Seal of Biliteracy.

For English, they must complete all language arts requirements for graduation with a GPA of 3.0 or higher, and fulfill one of several academic benchmarks—such as scoring "standard met" on the Grade 11 CAASPP for English language arts, earning a 3 or higher on the AP English exam, scoring a 4 or higher on the IB English exam, or achieving a score of 480 or higher on the SAT's Evidence-Based Reading and Writing section. English learners must also earn a level 4 on the oral language portion of the ELPAC.



To demonstrate proficiency in a language other than English, students must complete a four-year course of study in that language with a GPA of 3.0 or higher and meet one of the following: pass a world language AP exam with a score of 3 or higher; pass an IB exam with a score of 4 or higher; score intermediate, mid, or above on both the ACTFL Writing Proficiency Test and Oral Proficiency Interview; or pass a district-approved language exam at the proficient level or higher.

The achievement of these students reflects their commitment to academic excellence, cultural understanding, and lifelong learning. By attaining advanced skills in multiple languages, they are not only better prepared to navigate a global society, but also serve as role models of perseverance, curiosity, and success.
