

Shantall Porchia named interim director of Migrant Education Program



Veteran Migrant Education Program administrator Shantall Porchia was recently selected as interim director of the program. In her new role, she will lead the staff that supports migratory students and families across Tulare and Kings counties.

With more than 20 years of experience in public schools, Porchia has served as a California Mini-Corps student, elementary teacher, Title I resource teacher, district migrant resource teacher, and TCOE Migrant Education Program area administrator and program manager.

She began her career teaching in bilingual and structured English immersion programs for English language learners. To support migratory students, she has led efforts in identification and recruitment, provided technical assistance to school districts, coordinated supplemental services, managed data and compliance, delivered services directly for children in county labor camps, and worked closely with employers, communities, and school partners.

Porchia holds a bachelor's degree in education from California State University, Fresno, and a master's degree in educational administration and Clear Administrative Services Credential from National University. A fluent bilingual educator in English and Spanish, she is deeply committed to utilizing her life and professional experience to expand opportunities for migratory children.

Registration for the full-day Connected Schools Conference, scheduled for October 1, 2025, is now open.


